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President of L'Arche Greater Vancouver



It is an honor to submit this report as President of the Society of L'Arche Greater Vancouver. Following in the steps of our previous President, Trudi Shaw, presented a somewhat daunting prospect, but working together with our Community Leader Denise Haskett, we've been able to build on the work undertaken over the past few years.

A significant commitment of the Board this year has been the development of a formal Board recruitment process. To better serve the community we need to expand the number of Board members. We also need to find people with the specific skills required to better serve the Community's needs as they change over the years. The need for recruitment was brought home to us this year as Gary Begin left to take on the task of Foundation President and as Jim Dorsey's term as a Director has come to an end. In response to this situation, our newest Director, Ash Abhyankar and Penny Lim from the Foundation attended a workshop on Board recruitment. The information they gained has been quite useful to our Nominations Committee. Headed by Trudi Shaw, it has developed new guidelines and procedures for expanding the Board and orientating new members. These have already borne fruit and we are confident that they will continue to do so.

Our Housing Planning Committee has also been active under the guidance of Jim Dorsey, who although leaving the Board, has agreed to continue working with the Committee. They have received input from the Community and developed a Request for Proposals aimed at obtaining the help of consultants to assist us in exploring how long-term Community needs can best be met.

Another area of activity this past year has been the Board's endorsement of L'Arche Canada's compensation policy. We have not only committed to it in spirit, but have approved budgetary measures that will pursue its implementation.

Our joint meetings with the Foundation Board have proven to be useful in fostering communication and awareness of our shared goals in working on behalf of the L'Arche Greater Vancouver community. At our meeting last fall we paid a visit to each of the houses and enjoyed meeting with many of you in your home environments. I've been able to attend the Regional Board Council this past year. It has provided much information that is of use in Board activities. But even more so, it provided an opportunity to meet Board members from all of the Communities of the Western Region. They are a very impressive group of individuals who provide a resource of skills and experience on which we intend to draw in future.

So to all of you "A job well done", and be assured of your Board's commitment to continued work on your behalf.

I am pleased to report on the activities of the L'Arche Foundation of Greater Vancouver in this first combined Annual Report of the two societies. Since the Foundation exists solely to assist the Society of L'Arche Greater Vancouver in accomplishing its mission, it only makes sense to tell our stories in one place.

The last fiscal year has been a busy one with fundraising activities, new partnerships and celebrations. We were thrilled to be named one of the recipient organizations in Canada Life's 2011 Charity Softball Tournament. Our responsibilities were to make the day fun for the tournament participants and we were up to the challenge with various activities, including our own cheer team, the Ark Angels. Canada Life generously matched the money we raised and together we had over \$46,000 to use on our new vehicle fleet.

In the fall we hosted another Ark Builders Brunch filled with inspiration and joy as we recognized our key donors who faithfully keep our "ark" afloat. In late November we started the Advent Season with our Annual Benefit Concert. We were delighted to have a full house with Vancouver's own Gallery Singers performing in support of our sister L'Arche communities in Latin America.

Our Third Annual Art of Being Together drew in a number of new artists and guests. Funding from the City of Burnaby along with the generosity of our sponsors made it possible to spread the word and add more space to view and participate in the making of art that celebrates community and our need of each other.

I am deeply grateful to the dedicated personnel who daily live the mission of L'Arche. Our Foundation meetings start with someone sharing how the support of the Foundation has benefitted their life in community. These are highlights of our time together and serve to remind us of our important work. I am also grateful for the people who serve on the Board with me. I'm also thankful for the work of Tom Nowak, who has worked tirelessly in reviewing and revising the constitutions of both societies.

Community Leader/Executive Director



As I reflect on our year I am so grateful for the wonderful diversity of people who are drawn to L'Arche and this mission of sharing life together. The commitment of each person to build and strengthen the community really touches me. Our theme, "Come and See", taken from John's Gospel, guided many of our activities. It propelled us to be even more intentional about welcoming others and looking for Jesus in ourselves and in our world.

In September we hosted the Vancouver leg of the first-ever L'Arche Western Canada Pilgrimage. People came from Calgary, Comox Valley, Edmonton, Lethbridge and Winnipeg to join us in celebration, times of reflection, and a prayerful walk through the neighbourhood.

Another first for the community was our "38 Ways to Care" initiative, where many people engaged in simple acts of kindness as a way to prepare for our 38th Anniversary celebrations. It is beautiful to see people grow and their gifts revealed both within L'Arche and through their meaningful contributions to the greater community.

We continue to participate in L'Arche Regional and National retreats and formations which provide opportunities to build relationships and contribute to the larger L'Arche family. To ensure people have additional opportunities to be spiritually nourished we provided small group retreats locally on Bowen Island. All of these unique activities require on-going funding and I am very grateful to the L'Arche Foundation for their support.

Our community was busy this spring preparing for the CARF accreditation survey scheduled in June 2012. This process challenges us to be the best we can be in supporting people. I want to thank all those who work so hard to ensure the highest standards and quality of life possible for people in our homes and day programs.

Along with other L'Arche communities around the world we participated in the L'Arche International process on commitment and belonging. This provided important times of reflection together on what it means to be an intentional community and to offer important input to L'Arche International. Our Community Mandate was extended from March 2011 to December 2012 in order for us to explore accessible housing options for our members as well as dream about how we might grow. There was an extensive community consultation on this topic, from which a Vision and Objective Statement was developed. We are excited about how this initiative will unfold in the coming year.

We continue dialogue with our partner and major funder Community Living BC about the changing needs of people and for ongoing equitable funding. We are grateful for their support.

I want to close with heartfelt thanks to Tom Nowak for taking on the role of LGV Board President and Gary Begin for his continued guidance on the LFGV Board. To all members of both Boards and my leadership team, thank you for your passion and commitment to L'Arche and the privilege of working with you.

Day Programs

I am grateful for the strong leadership in both programs and the commitment and compassion of the assistants who have assisted me to grow since coming into this role almost a year ago. They have been open and have embraced many new ideas. We have a respectful and collaborative relationship that will continue to provide the best possible day time activities for the people we serve.

The Emmaus Centre is a multi-activity based program that includes 12 adults with developmental disabilities. We were delighted to welcome a new part-time participant in January. Six participants are part-time, two live at home with their parents and seven are over the age of 55. The Emmaus assistant team consists of one team leader, three full-time assistants and four regular volunteers.

Emmaus provides meaningful, recreational, artistic and social activities which include baking, music, drama, arts and crafts. Emmaus participates in outreach activities such as the Hospitality Project at a local food bank where cookies baked by the Emmaus team are offered and relationships are built. They are also busy with letter writing, creating art cards and inviting guests to their Friday lunches.

We are grateful for the funders who made it possible for the Emmaus Centre to have a deck and wheelchair ramp. This allows for an additional fire exit and much easier access for those with mobility issues to enjoy the outdoors without having to actually leave the building.

Neighbours Helping Neighbours (NHN) is our outreach-focused program. The NHN crew is comprised of one manager, four adults with developmental disabilities and two volunteers. They provide a valuable service which includes lawn and garden care, rubbish removal and simple maintenance tasks for seniors and others with physical disabilities in Burnaby, New Westminster and South and East Vancouver. This past year NHN attracted 23 new customers, helped 65 clients and worked over 2300 hours in total. The popularity and demand for this service has meant an increase in repeat customers.

Neighbours Helping Neighbours also volunteered a total of 540 hours in a variety of other ways such as Meals on Wheels, New Vista Society and serving coffee to people at the Food Bank.

Human Resources

It was with our community theme of "Come and See" that we welcomed a number of people to L'Arche in the last year.



Part of L'Arche's mission is to welcome young people to our homes and day programs as Assistants to experience community as they share life with people with and without developmental disabilities. Over the last year we welcomed Assistants from Canada, Japan, Jordan, South Korea and the Netherlands.

In order to ensure high standards and quality care, L'Arche Greater Vancouver provides ongoing formation and training to Assistants in addition to individual training in the homes and day programs. Formation is held monthly to familiarize Assistants with the identity and mission and the spirituality and values of L'Arche.

Six training sessions were offered in the Assistant meetings over the last year. Topics covered were in the areas of team work, care of people and health and safety. Workshops on conflict resolution and leading effective meetings were offered for people in supervisory positions at L'Arche.

L'Arche depends on the people who give their time and energy to build and maintain our community life, help us reach out to the wider community and enable our members with a disability to be involved and use their gifts in the wider community. We are grateful for the volunteer hours our personnel and friends offered to L'Arche over the year.

During the last year we experienced some difficulties obtaining work permits for some of our international applicants. Thankfully, we were able to increase our recruitment locally and nationally.

Valuing people's commitment and responsibilities in L'Arche is important. We were able to further implement the L'Arche Canada compensation policy honoring people's length of service in L'Arche as well as their roles. Our challenge continues to be to secure more funding in order to offer equitable wages and benefits.









Residential Programs

As I go into my fourth year in this role I am once again impressed with the many people that make L'Arche a unique model of intentional community. I am grateful for the dedication of the house leaders and their team members as they often are called upon to

balance complex needs and still keep the homes running smoothly. I'm also appreciative of Kuniko Fedoruk for her calm demeanor and meticulous administrative support.

Most of all I am thankful for the members with disabilities in our homes. Their kindness and commitment to community continue to inspire me in my role and affirm my place in L'Arche. They are my teachers.

It is these 22 individuals who are the heart of our community. They live in our six homes - Bethel, Creation and Unity (which are attached to our main building on Sussex Ave) Emily, Nazirah and The Crossing (which are in the surrounding neighbourhood). Together with the assistants who support them, they share life together in family-like settings.

This year we made some progress in making our homes more accessible. The people in Emily House now enjoy safer and easier access with a roll-in shower and other features in the upstairs bathroom. Creation House has a new deck that is surrounded by tall trees and overlooks the park next to L'Arche. We are thankful for the generous donors who made these improvements to our homes possible.

Annual Quality of Life reviews were held for all individuals and indicated that everyone is happy in their homes. The House Assistants made every effort that core people could realize the wishes they articulated in their review. Family members have given consistent positive feedback and are grateful that their loved one has a community that supports them and helps them reach their potential.

We are grateful for another year with everyone in good health, the Community and God's grace.




